Dear Participants

Welcome to the ECPR's 45th Joint Sessions, and welcome to Nottingham! I wish you all an inspiring, productive, and pleasant five days.

The Joint Sessions of Workshops continue to be a hallmark event of the ECPR. The formula of bringing together small groups of scholars, senior and junior, working on a particular theme, to discuss each other's papers for five days, while offering plenty of opportunities to meet and mingle with the participants in parallel Workshops, has proven most successful.

It seems timely, in early 2017, for a UK-based institution of higher education to host the ECPR Joint Sessions of Workshops, and in so doing to reaffirm the commitment of UK universities to remain at the heart of the European research enterprise. The University of Nottingham can trace its history back to at least 1881. The School of Politics and International Relations is of rather more recent vintage, being founded in 1965. The School has around fifty members of academic staff, making it one of the largest departments of Politics & IR in the UK, along with nine Research Centres and Institutes,

reflecting the strength and breadth of research activity in the School.

We are committed to both international and interdisciplinary research – we co-operate closely with our sister schools at the University of Nottingham, Ningbo, China (UNNC) and the University of Nottingham Malaysia Campus in Kuala Lumpur (UNMC). At both UNNC and UNMC we operate jointly with History, and several of our Research Centres are explicitly interdisciplinary – for example the Institute for Asia-Pacific Studies, the Nottingham Interdisciplinary Centre for Economic and Political Research, the China Policy Institute, and the Centre for the Study of Political Ideologies.

We also have an established history of collaboration with the ECPR, and the School is currently also hosting

the Summer School of the ECPR's Standing Group on Political Parties, the longest-running of the ECPR Standing Group Summer Schools.

We hope you will enjoy Nottingham – the city has much to offer in the way of food, entertainment, culture, and sport. The location for this year's Joint Sessions, the University's Jubilee Campus, is built on the site of what was once a bicycle factory. It has become a hub for innovative and environmentally sustainable architecture and we believe offers an excellent set of conference facilities.

The University of Nottingham

The first British university to establish a campus overseas, Nottingham can claim to be a truly 'global University'

Its origins as the city's first civic college date back as far as 1881, but the University of Nottingham moved to what is now its main campus in 1928. The 35-acre plot was donated by Sir Jesse Boot, owner of the Boots pharmaceutical company. Even from its early days, the University attracted high-profile visiting lecturers including Albert Einstein, Mahatma Gandhi and HG Wells.

Overseas pioneers

Always forward looking, Nottingham established the first campus of a British university overseas, in Malaysia

in 2000. This was followed by the historic agreement to set up a campus in Ningbo, China, in 2004 – the very first overseas campus in China by a western university. Nottingham has been described as 'the nearest Britain has to a truly global university' (*Times Good University Guide 2016*).

Today, the University is one of the largest in the UK. It is home to 44,000 students and 9,000 staff and has an income of £635 million. It is also one of the most popular universities in the UK among graduate employers and was named University of the Year for Graduate Employment in 2017.



Nottingham is ranked in the world's top 75 by the QS World University Rankings 2015/16, and 8th in the UK for research power according to the Research Excellence Framework 2014. It was also voted the world's greenest campus for four consecutive years.

The University has been responsible for several innovations which have had an enormous impact on society. The most famous of these is the development of magnetic resonance imaging by Sir Peter Mansfield, who received the Nobel Prize for his work in 2003. There are now 22,000 scanners in operation worldwide, carrying out more than 60 million examinations annually.

Politics at Notts

The School of Politics and International Relations at the University of Nottingham was founded in 1965.

Along with the Departments of Politics at Manchester and Oxford, the School is currently home to the British Election Study, which has been the key body for analysing electoral behaviour in the UK for more than 50 years.



Out and about in the city

Located in the heart of England, Nottingham is famous the world over as the home of philanthropic outlaw Robin Hood

The thriving city of Nottingham – only the second city in England to be accredited a UNESCO City of Literature status for its association with writers such as DH Lawrence and Alan Sillitoe – is buzzing with events and attractions all year round.

Its inspirational arts, entertainment and heritage venues include the Theatre Royal and Royal Concert Hall; Nottingham Playhouse; Nottingham Contemporary – one of the UK's leading contemporary art galleries; the Motorpoint Arena; and the Galleries of Justice Museum to name but a few.

Sporting glories

Nottingham became England's official Home of Sport in 2015, and is home to world-famous sporting venues including Trent Bridge cricket ground, the National Ice Centre and the National Water Sports Centre. Nottingham also has two clubs in the English Football League, Nottingham Forest and Notts County. The latter is the oldest football club in the world currently playing at professional level.

Cultural treasures


High on Castle Rock and commanding spectacular views over the city, Nottingham Castle is a 17th century ducal mansion now serving as a municipal museum of art from around the world. Art lovers should also visit the city's international art centre, Nottingham Contemporary.

The National Videogame Arcade offers fun, interactive displays and a permanent exhibition showcasing the history of video gaming.

What lies beneath

Nottingham is built on more than 500 man-made sandstone caves dating back to medieval times. Descend below street level and discover how the caves were used as tanneries, bomb shelters and homes. You can even sup in style in a cave pub like Ye Olde Trip to Jerusalem or the Malt Cross, which used the caves over the centuries for everything from beer storage to cockfights!

The European Consortium for Political Research

The ECPR is an independent, scholarly association that supports and encourages the training, research and cross-national co-operation of political scientists through Europe and the world

Membership

ECPR membership is institutional and currently comprises nearly 350 universities concerned with the teaching and research of political science. Membership is paid by the university, but it is the individuals within it who receive the benefit; from Master's and PhD students, through to the most senior professor.

ECPR events

General Conference

The ECPR's General Conference is the largest annual gathering of political scientists in Europe, regularly bringing together some 2,000

scholars from across the world. The academic programme features around 60 Sections and over 400 Panels covering the full spectrum of political science and international relations, as well as an engaging Plenary programme of topical and high-profile lectures and Roundtables.

Joint Sessions of Workshops

Unique in format and considered the highlight of the annual international political science calendar, the Joint Sessions of Workshops have been held in a different European city every spring since 1973. The Joint Sessions remain extremely competitive, with fewer than 25

Workshops taking place, each containing 15–20 participants. Participants present a Paper which is then discussed and interrogated in detail by the full group, providing unrivalled opportunity for feedback and development of research.

Methods School

ECPR believes that good research requires solid methodology. Our biannual Methods School offers training across all methodologies, and caters to the needs of macro- and micro-level research. The courses, which can be followed on their own or combined over one or more events, cover quantitative and qualitative designs as well as positivist and interpretative perspectives.





The Winter School in Methods and Techniques takes place around February/March each year; the Summer School runs July–August. Combining the Summer and Winter Schools, you can follow training tracks to create a bespoke package.

Funding

To encourage participation in ECPR events, every year we award around 200 grants to scholars from full-member institutions. Grants are a key membership benefit, but the number for each event is capped, so applying does not guarantee success. Applicants are limited to one ECPR Grant/Registration Refund in any two-year period.

ECPR grants contribute towards attendance and are paid after the event. We also offer funding to our Standing Groups, either as ‘seed money’ to help start up a new group, or to support the organisation of a summer school. See the Funding tab of our website to find out more.

MyECPR

Staff and students at Member institutions are encouraged to set up a MyECPR account, through which you can register for events, and keep track of Section, Workshop, Panel and Paper submissions. You can also make contact with other scholars who share your research interests, and subscribe to relevant news bulletins.

Publications

Journals and book series

ECPR co-publishes four leading journals: *European Political Science*, *European Journal of Political Research*, *European Political Science Review* and the *European Journal of International Relations*. It also publishes the high-profile *Comparative Politics* book series, with Oxford University Press.

ECPR Press

In 2005 the ECPR launched its own imprint: ECPR Press. The Press publishes high-quality *Monographs* and collections of *Essays*, along with a small selection of out-of-print *Classics* that have made a significant contribution to political studies scholarship.

The imprint also includes a highly respected series of multi-authored, edited volumes, *Studies in European Political Science*, many of which have developed from Workshops and Panels at ECPR events.

Standing Groups and Research Networks

The ECPR’s Standing Groups and Research Networks are formalised groups of researchers that operate with the institutional support of the ECPR. Reflecting the breadth of the discipline, there are currently over 50 groups covering all sub-fields of political science and international relations. Anyone with an interest in that field can join a Group or Network and instantly connect with scholars working in their area through regular mailings, organisation of Sections, Panels or Workshops at ECPR events, annual meetings or even their own international conferences and summer schools.

Prizes

In recognition of the contributions made to all areas of political science,

ECPR awards ten prizes each year. These recognise achievement at all stages of a scholar’s career, including the annual Jean Blondel PhD Prize awarded for the most outstanding thesis by a scholar at an ECPR member institution, and the biennial Lifetime Achievement Award, for a scholar who has made an outstanding contribution to the discipline.

Jean Blondel PhD Prize

Veto et Peto:

*Patterns of Presidential
Activism in Central
and Eastern Europe*

Since 2003, the ECPR has awarded an annual prize for the best PhD thesis in politics, encompassing International Relations, Political Theory, and Public Administration. The prize fund is €1,000 and the winner is offered the opportunity to adapt their thesis for publication as an ECPR Press Monograph.

The Blondel Prize jury, which was unanimous in its choice of winner, was last year chaired by Birgit Sauer (University of Vienna, also representing the ECPR). The jury also comprised Petra Meier (University of Antwerp), Christoph Scherrer (University of Kassel) and Ferdinand Müller-Rommel (University of Lüneburg).

Philipp Köker's thesis maps and explains patterns in the activism of democratic presidents in nine Central and Eastern European democracies between 1990 and 2010. This field has been subject to a number of studies over the last decade, but few scholars have explained how presidents use their formal powers and actively intervene in politics.

Köker proposes a nested analysis approach, a statistical analysis and in-depth case studies which, his thesis argues, explains presidential activism in and by the constitutional setting and the political environment. He put together an original data set including semi-structured elite-interviews on the use of presidents' legislative powers. With these data and his innovative approach, the panel judged



that Köker's thesis offers impressive cross-country empirical analyses. His qualitative analysis in four countries focuses on presidential vetoes and presidential activism in government formation, censure and dismissal.

Köker shows that popular presidential elections, cohabitation between president and government, as well as a low government seat share, are the most important predictors of presidential activism. These factors also correlated with more frequent use of powers.

Köker's study also suggests that intra-governmental divisions may well be another explanatory factor for presidential activism.

Our Jury's verdict

Environmental Policy Dismantling in the EU: Disintegration by Stealth or Saviour of Integration?

This €1,000 prize is awarded annually to the best Paper presented at the previous year's Joint Sessions. Candidates must have gained their PhD within the previous five years.

The jury, chaired by Kris Deschouwer (Vrije Universiteit Brussel), also comprised Birgit Sauer (University of Vienna), Reuven Hazan (Hebrew University of Jerusalem) Anna Sroka (University of Warsaw) and Cas Mudde (University of Georgia).

Viviane Gravey's Paper aims to ascertain whether the environmental ambition of the EU is being reduced and, if that is the case, which forces are driving this change.

Her focus is on 'policy dismantling', a process that has so far been widely analysed, but mainly at domestic level and often only in relation to redistributive policies.

She puts forward an analytical framework, adapted from Bauer & Knill's model for the analysis of domestic dismantling, and applies it to the analysis of dismantling at EU level by taking into account its consensual, multi-level and also contested nature.

This adapted framework is subsequently applied to three case studies of environmental policy-dismantling in the EU, allowing the author to see clearly which actors have been using which strategies – and what effects this has produced.

Viviane also shows how efforts of policy dismantling in the EU are interconnected with the broader debate on the future forms and degree of European integration.

Svenja Krauss is a PhD candidate and Research Fellow at Humboldt University Berlin. Prior to that, she was a Research Fellow for the DFG research project *Bringing policies back in: Explaining payoff allocation in coalition governments* at the

University of Bamberg (October 2014 – March 2015) and at the University of Hamburg (April 2015 – October 2016).

Svenja gained her BA in Political Science from the University of Mannheim, and her MA, also in Political Science, from the University of Bamberg.

Her main research topics are Comparative Politics, Parties, Coalition Governments, and Quantitative Methods.

Limits on Legitimacy

Research on the virtuous circle of governance suggests that the minimal requirement of legitimacy is the provision of services that constituents value. Whether the provider is an established state or a non-state group, sustained legitimacy requires service providers to be credible in their promises over time; to be relatively fair, even-handed, and efficient; and to have a reasonable claim to exercise authority over the population. If the service provider is also extracting resources, there must be means to discourage free riding. Full-blown states have all these capacities, and as these capacities decline, so does their legitimacy. But what kinds of

resources do non- or partial-states have? Equally important is what kind of legitimacy they need and for what purposes. State legitimacy enables a government to stay in power without constant force. What does the more limited legitimacy of non-state actors facilitate?

Margaret Levi is the Sara Miller McCune Director of the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences (CASBS) at Stanford and Professor of Political Science, Stanford University. She is also Jere L. Bacharach Professor Emerita of International Studies in the Department of Political Science at the University of Washington.

She became a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2001, a John Simon Guggenheim Fellow in 2002, and a member of the National Academy of Sciences in 2015. She served as president of the American Political Science Association 2004–2005. In 2014 she received the William H. Riker Prize in Political Science. She earned her PhD from Harvard University in 1974, the year she joined the faculty of the University of Washington. She has been a Senior Fellow at the Watson Institute for International Studies, Brown University. She held the Chair in Politics, US Studies Centre at the University of Sydney, 2009–13 and is an Affiliate Professor there. At the University of Washington she was director of the CHAOS (Comparative Historical Analysis of Organizations and States) Center and formerly the Harry Bridges Chair and Director of the Harry Bridges Center for Labor Studies.

Professor Levi is the author of numerous books, including *Of Rule and Revenue* (University of California Press, 1988); *Consent, Dissent, and Patriotism* (Cambridge University Press, 1997); *Analytic Narratives* (Princeton University Press, 1998); and *Cooperation Without Trust?* (Russell Sage, 2005). *In the Interest of Others* (Princeton, 2013), co-authored with John Ahlquist, explores how organisations provoke willingness to act beyond material interest.

In other work, she investigates the conditions under which people come to believe their governments are legitimate and the consequences of those beliefs for compliance, consent, and the rule of law.

Professor Levi's research focuses on how to improve the quality of government, and she is committed to improving supply chains so that the goods we consume are produced in a way that sustains workers and the environment. In 2015 she co-authored *Labor Standards in International Supply Chains* (Edward Elgar).

Professor Levi was general editor of *Cambridge Studies in Comparative Politics* and is co-general editor of the *Annual Review of Political Science*. She serves on the boards of the Social Science Research Council (SSRC); Center for Advanced Studies in the Social Sciences (CEACS) in Madrid; Scholar and Research Group of the World Justice Project, and the Berggruen Institute.
