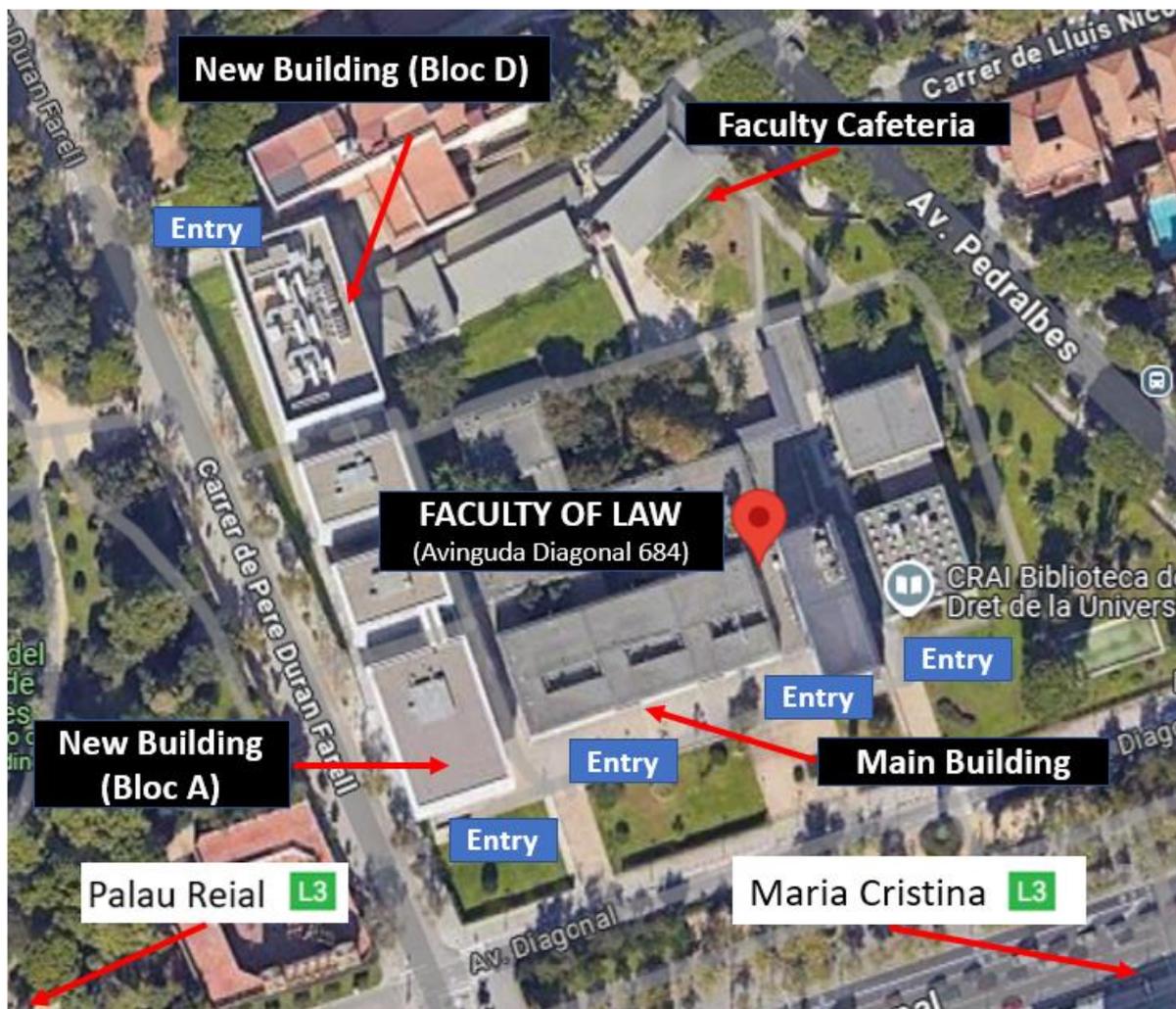

Pre-conference meet-up

Are you new to attending a conference? Or an early-career academic? Or both? Then please come to an informal pre-conference meet-up, where you will be able to meet with some members of the Steering Committee from the Standing Group as well as the conference organisers.

The meet-up will take place at the [Jardins de la Vila Amèlia](#), Carrer de Santa Amèlia, 91, Sarrià-Sant Gervasi, 08034 Barcelona. It is a 13-minute walk from the Faculty of Law (see directions above).

Getting to and from the airport

To get to the conference venue from the airport, here are the options:

- **Taxi:** A taxi from Barcelona Airport to the Faculty of Law costs approximately €25-30 and takes about 20-30 minutes, depending on traffic. Taxi ranks are located directly outside the arrival areas of Terminal T1 and Terminals T2 A and T2 B. Ride-hailing services like Uber and Bolt are also available.

- **Bus:** Aerobus is a shuttle service that runs from both airport terminals to Plaça de Catalunya in the city center. To reach the Law Faculty, get off at Plaça Espanya, then take metro line L3 to Palau Reial. From there, it's a 4-minute walk to the Faculty of Law. The total journey takes around 45 minutes. Aerobus tickets cost €5.90 for a one-way trip or €10.20 for a round trip. Buses run every 5-10 minutes during peak hours. The ticket only covers the Aerobus journey, and we highly recommend purchasing it through the [Aerobus website](#).
- **Train:** The train station (Rodalies de Catalunya Renfe) at the airport is located across from Terminal T2. A shuttle service connects Terminals T1 and T2. The train ride to the city centre takes approximately 20 minutes, with trains running every 30 minutes from 05:08 to 23:07. To reach the city from the airport, take the R2N train line to *Sants Estació*. From there, transfer to metro line L3 in the direction of *Zona Universitària* and get off at *Palau Reial*. The Law Faculty is less than a four-minute walk from the station.
- **Metro:** Take metro line L9S toward *Zona Universitària* until the final stop. Then, transfer to line L3 toward *Trinitat Nova* and get off at the next stop, *Palau Reial*. From there, it's less than a four-minute walk to the Law Faculty.

Hotel options

Barcelona is large city with many accommodation options and great public transportation. Though we recommend booking accommodation close-by to the conference venue, participants can always take advantage of the bus, metro and tram systems to move around the city.
